Poison Prevention Program Grades 9 - 12

Objectives: After participation in the poison prevention program, students should be able to:

- 1. Define poison.
- 2. Explain appropriate action if a poisoning or suspected poisoning occurs.
- 3. Discuss why accidental poisonings occur more often in children 5 years of age and younger.
- 4. State 2 ways to protect self/others from unintentional poisonings.
- 5. State one current drug of abuse and the possible immediate and long-term consequences of its abuse.

Time required: approximately 60 minutes.
