Poison Prevention Program

Grades 6-8

Objectives: After participation in the poison prevention program students should be able to:

- 1. Define poison.
- 2. State the four routes of poisoning.
- 3. Explain appropriate action if a poisoning or suspected poisoning occurs.
- 4. Discuss why accidental poisonings occur more often in children 5 years of age and younger.
- 5. Discuss ways to protect younger siblings and precautions to take when babysitting.
- 6. Discuss and state one example of an intentional and an unintentional poisoning.

Time required: approximately 60 minutes
